# THE GOSPEL

## Luke 21:25-36

In this passage we come across a description of horror almost. The gratitude we can see is in the assurance that we have been both warned that we may suffer, but we have also been promised that God and His words remain throughout disaster. There is the hope that with the strength of God we can stay true to our faith. This is perhaps an immediate reason for gratitude. We are reminded that God is always there.
